GROUND BREAKING

The 2001-02 Tigers look to build upon their three victories in 2000-01 with a mix of veterans and newcomers

Another season, yet the same challenge for head coach Greg Jones and the LSU men's golf team. For the second consecutive season, Jones must replace three seniors who were the core of the program.

Alan Morgan, Craig Taylor and Billy Dressler have all graduated, leaving just one senior, Nathan Goulding, on the 2001-2002 team. Jones faced the same dilemma in his first season in Baton Rouge three years ago. Michael Vallilo, Jason Humphries and Jeremy Wilkinson all graduated prior to the 2000-01 season, but Taylor, Dressler and Morgan were there to step in and fill their shoes.

This season, Jones will count on more than just Goulding for leadership, and he has plenty of players to look to.

"I will count on a lot of leadership from guys like John Humphries and Nathan

Goulding," said Jones. "John has realized that Alan is gone, so he needs to be amazing everyday. He and Nathan are the men."

Humphries was a Second-Team All-Southeastern Conference selection a season ago and posted a 73.2 stroke average, third best on the team behind Morgan's 71.5. Humphries was also named to the All-Louisiana Golf Second Team.

Goulding played in nine tournaments for LSU last season, finishing the season on the team with a 72.7 stroke average. The Tigers will need every player to continue in some way this time around to avoid burnout, something Jones said his team experienced last season.

After achieving a national ranking of 14th on March 21, 2001, LSU stumbled somewhat late in the season and fell out of the

national ranks by the end of the regular season. Jones said he believes his team had tried so hard to climb back into the national picture that they ran out of gas at the end.

"I could see it coming last year, but I did not know what to do but now I do. Last season we achieved a lot and we became pretty good rapidly, and I think the guys said 'we are good and they stopped thinking and didn't execute.'"

The 2001-02 team will feature just one senior, three juniors and seven freshman. Goulding is still relatively new to the program, after transferring to LSU prior to last season. Garrett Prather, a junior from Crowley, La., had five rounds of par or better and a 75.2 stroke average a year ago. Prather, Goulding and Humphries form arguably the best trio of golfers in the SEC, and all three



still have plenty to accomplish. Junior Chip Lee gained important experience last season, playing in two tournaments. Jones said Lee has improved considerably since last year, and is ready to make an impact this season.

Brandon Aydlett, Neil Self, Jeff Riemann and Jason Horrell all red-shirted last season. Three true freshmen will join the squad this season. Tucker Ervin, from Mt. Pleasant, S.C., Heath West, from Dothan, Ala., and Adam Swope from Wesley Chapel, Fla., will all have a shot at contributing to the team early.

"We are looking to the three-week break between our first and second tournaments to see where we are. Someone will get valuable experience out of the first tournament. I expect Heath West to step up this season, and with the other guys it is wide open."

The 2001-02 schedule will begin on Sept. 10-11 with a trip to

Kiawah Island, S.C., the same place the 2000-01 season started. The Tigers will then have a break until Oct. 2-3, when they travel to Newport, R.I., to take part in the Adams Cup.

The Tigers will host the ninth-annual Country Club of Louisiana Intercollegiate on Oct. 29-30 at the CCLA. LSU will also play host to the LSU Spring Invitational on March 1-3 at the University Club. LSU won the CCLA in 2000, firing a tournament-record 8-under par 856. The Tigers will look to win consecutive CCLA titles for the first time.

Jones said, "This season we want to try to get better every tournament. We are younger and have less experience compared to last season. We want to see our younger guys get better and we need to focus on the little things. We ran out of gas at the end of last year. We were trying so hard all season to climb back into the SEC picture, and we just ran out of gas at the end."

Greg Jones enters his third season as head coach of the LSU men's golf team in 2001-02. After two successful seasons in Baton Rouge, he hopes this year's team can continue to strive for excellence.

Jones will lead a young team this season. His third LSU squad is comprised of seven freshman, three juniors and just one senior. Jones' astute knowledge of the game and unquestionable leadership should help his youthful team enjoy success.

He has a simple philosophy on coaching that contains three parts: preparation, simplification and commitment. Jones says these three words are the key to success for his program.

"Preparation is everything in our philosophy. We must prepare our players in practice to go on the road," Jones said. "Anyone can play their home course, but we must be prepared to play any course we come across."

In his second season in Baton Rouge, Jones led LSU to three tournament victories, the program's most since the 1995-96 season. Jones also led the Tigers to a national ranking, climbing as high as No. 14 in March of 2001. He was named 2001 Louisiana Coach of the Year on the and led LSU to its first postseason appearance since 1998. The Tigers qualified for the 2001 NCAA Regional at Williamsburg, Va., and finished tied for 19th place.

Jones is a 1987 graduate of South Alabama, and the LSU job is the second of his career. He served as the head coach at his alma mater in Mobile for six seasons prior to coming to Baton Rouge in 1999. In six seasons at South Alabama, Jones' Jaguars finished first in the Sun Belt Conference five times, while finishing second in 1996 and 97. The Jaguars advanced to the NCAA East Regional five out of six seasons, missing the postseason in just 1997-98. South Alabama won 15 tournaments with Jones at the helm, and he was named Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year four times.



Jones' first season at LSU, 1999-2000, was a rebuilding year for the LSU golf program, but a solid foundation existed which translated into an extremely successful season in 2000-01. Jones had to replace three seniors following the 1999-2000 season, and must do the same entering this season. Billy Dressler, Alan Morgan and Craig Taylor have graduated and a young group is expected to step up and contribute.

Jones utilized the talents and leadership of his three seniors in 2000-01 to lead LSU to one of its best seasons in years. Known for his strong recruiting efforts, Jones hauled in another excellent class this season. Heath West, a Dothan, Ala., native, highlights this year's class. Tucker Ervin, from Mt. Pleasant, S.C., and Adam Swope, of Wesley Chapel, Fla., are the other two true freshman on this year's squad.

Prior to the 2000-01 season, Jones signed three players who were ranked as the best in each of their home states: Jason Horrell from Indiana, Brandon Aydtlett from Louisiana and Jeff Riemann from Mississippi. All three are expected to contribute in some way this season.



Jones is a great motivator and also has a unique way to relate to his players. His positive attitude and friendly demeanor are two reasons for the close relationships he develops with his players. The main reason may be that he was a player on the college level himself.

Jones played at South Alabama and was an All-American in 1986. He also participated in the U.S. Amateur three times, and the U.S. Mid Amateur once. Jones also participated at the NCAA Championships twice.

Jones tries to make the game of golf as simple and understandable for his players as possible. The process of simplification enables his players to focus on what is of utmost importance at all times. Jones tries to simplify each player's swing so they can understand what their swing produces and what type of game they have. He considers himself a "green light" coach, meaning he encourages his players to aim at the flag because he expects his team to always have razor-sharp short games.

"Aiming right at the flag will enable our guys to make more birdies and save more pars Jones said."

The last part of his philosophy is commitment, and is the part Jones worries the least about.

Jones wants to continue to build on the tradition and success of the LSU program each year, and if history is any indication, then a rise to elite status is very reachable. The program has won 15 Southeastern Conference titles in its history, as well as four national championships.

The school has also produced many successful professional golfers such as Emlyn Aubrey, Bob Friend, Perry Moss and 2001 PGA Champion David Toms.

"I want to be in a position to compete for championships every year. With the quality of facilities we have and the climate here as good as it is, we have everything we need."

Jones is a native of Mobile, Ala., and graduated from South Alabama with a bachelor of science in Business Administration. Jones was born on April 13, 1965. He and his wife Robyn were married on April 29, 2000.

As a player at South Alabama, Jones posted eight victories, three U.S. Amateur appearances and one NCAA appearance in two years. At the conclusion of the 1986 season, he was named an All-American. After finishing his collegiate career in 1987, Jones played professionally for five years on the Emerald Coast (Hooters), Space Coast, and the TC Jordan (combined and formed the Nike) tours.

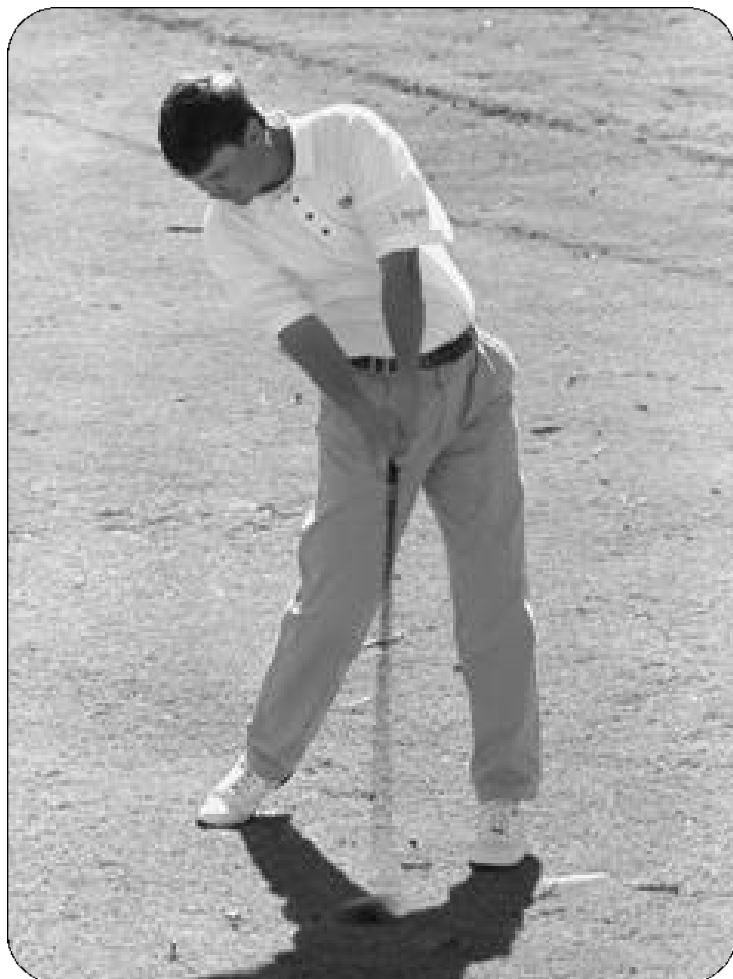

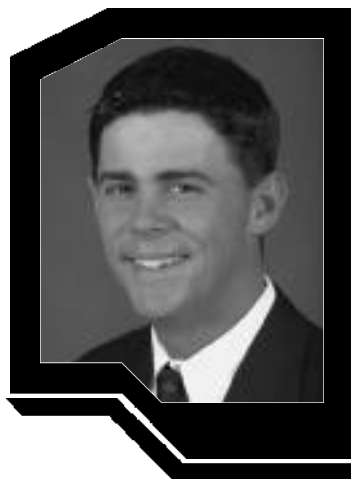

2001 CCLA Intercollegiate

The LSU men's golf team will host the ninth annual Country Club of Louisiana Intercollegiate Oct. 29-30 at the CCLA. The Tigers will attempt to win their second consecutive CCLA title, and third overall. LSU won the inaugural event in 1993, and again last season. LSU broke nearly every record at the 2000 event. The Tigers shot an 8-under 856, a CCLA 54-hole team record. Alan Morgan fired a 10-under 206, a 54-hole individual record. In 2001, LSU will welcome another talented field to Baton Rouge. LSU will be joined by 14 teams this season, including eight Southeastern Conference teams. UAB, College of Charleston, North Florida, Florida State, Southeastern Louisiana and Tulsa round out the 15 team field. LSU edged Tulsa by four

strokes for the 2000 title. The tournament will feature 36 holes on Oct. 29, and the final 18 on Oct. 30.

The Country Club of Louisiana is one of two courses home to the LSU men's golf team. The CCLA is a par-72 course located roughly five miles from the LSU campus on Highland Road. The course, which opened in 1986 has hosted the CCLA Intercollegiate each fall since 1993. The Tigers won the inaugural event in 1993, and again last season in 2000. The CCLA is 7,060 yards.

The University Club, a par-72 course with a yardage of 7,274. The course opened in the fall of 1998. The U-Club is located on nearly 275 acres of land seven miles south of LSU on Nicholson Dr. (La. 30). The Club is the LSU golf team's true home course. In March 2001, the club hosted its first tournament. The Inaugural LSU Spring Invitational was held March 5-6, with LSU taking the title by five strokes. The club includes a lavish clubhouse and meeting room, as well as a state-of-the-art clubhouse and practice area.



2002 LSU Spring Invitational

LSU will host the second-annual LSU Spring Invitational March 1-3 at the University Club in Baton Rouge. Last season, in the inaugural event, LSU won by five strokes. The Tigers survived a 14-over 302 in the first round to win the tournament. LSU will welcome 18 teams, including three Louisiana schools for the 2002 event.

Throughout its 68-year history, the Southeastern Conference has been a leader in the integration of athletic competition and higher education.

Since its formation in 1933, the SEC has achieved both stature and stability by designating governing/voting power to the presidents of the member institutions. They have determined the policies of the conference and through the years, this involvement has been the principal source of strength in the evolution of the SEC.

Intercollegiate athletics has encountered many challenges in the 1990s and again the SEC provided guidance. In 1993, the member institutions adopted The Principles of Gender Equity. Committed to increasing the quantity and quality of women's athletics opportunities, each school provides at least two more women's intercollegiate programs than the number of men's.

Faced with the task of conference realignment after competing with 10 members since 1966, the SEC welcomed the University of Arkansas and the University of South Carolina in 1991.

SEC schools began athletic competition with one another almost 100 years ago as members of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Seven institutions (Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, Sewanee and Vanderbilt) attended the SIAA organizational meeting of faculty representatives in Atlanta in 1894. The seven-member SIAA expanded to 19 institutions in 1895, and by 1920, there were 30 members.



The larger schools reorganized as the Southern Conference in 1920. Despite an original limit of 16, the membership grew to 23 by 1928.

The 13 members west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized as the Southeastern Conference at the annual SC meeting in 1932. The 10 coast members remained in the Southern Conference. Charter members of the new conference were: Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt. Sewanee withdrew in 1940, Georgia Tech in 1964 and Tulane in 1966.

The first SEC champions were crowned in 1933 in four sports: baseball, basketball, football and outdoor track. The league's inaugural championship event was a basketball tournament in Atlanta in 1933. Records show the first men's team title for cross country was awarded in 1935, while golf and swimming were added in 1937. The league later began hosting championships in tennis (1953) and indoor track (1957).

In the 1979-1980 academic year, SEC championships for women were recognized in basketball, tennis and volleyball. The following year, golf, gymnastics, swimming and track and field were added. The administration of women's athletics officially came under the auspices of the conference office in 1984.

The SEC currently regulates nine men's sports and 11 women's sports: Men — baseball, basketball, football, golf, swimming, tennis and track (cross country, indoor and outdoor). Women — basketball, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track (cross country, indoor and outdoor) and volleyball. As we have entered a new century, the SEC maintains its position as one of the premier conferences in terms of academic achievements and athletic success.

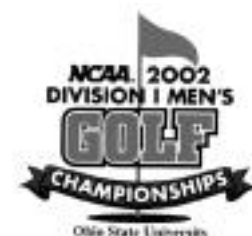

BACK IN THE SPOTLIGHT

In just his second season at LSU, head coach Greg Jones felt his team was on the verge of being a force in the Southeastern Conference, but lacked the consistency all good teams display



ALL-AMERICAN ALAN MORGAN

Entering the season, LSU had three talented seniors and a handful of underclassmen. The Tigers began the season in Charleston, S.C., at the Cleveland Golf Kiawah Island Intercollegiate. Led by sophomore Garrett Prather, LSU finished fourth out of 15 teams. Prather shot a first-round 70 to finish seventh, his first career top-10 finish. Senior Billy Dressler added a first-round 3-under-par 69. LSU shot an 11-over 875 for the tournament.

A week later LSU traveled to Knoxville, Tenn., for the 2000 Tennessee Tournament of Champions. The tigers earned their first victory in the Greg Jones era by firing a final-round 1-under 287 to win the tournament by five strokes over Virginia. Senior Alan Morgan claimed medalist honors with a 7-under 209. Morgan shot a second-round 5-under 67 to edge Augusta State's Jamie Elson by one stroke. John Humphries and Dressler placed seventh and 11th, respectively, to lead LSU to its first tournament win since the 1999 Bridges All-American.

LSU's quest for consistency took a hit in the next tournament in Dallas, Texas. At the Red River Classic Shootout on Oct. 9-10, LSU shot a season worst 20-over par 308 in the final round to finish 14th out of 15. LSU's lone bright spot was Morgan. He shot a first-round 67 and followed that with a 70 in the second round to finish in a tie for ninth place. No other golfer finished higher than 34th for LSU. The Tigers got back on track the next week at the Gary Koch/Cleveland Golf Intercollegiate in Tampa, Fla. LSU shot a final-round 9-under 279 to finish third and had two players finish in the top-10 individually. Senior Craig Taylor fired a 66 and a 68 in the final two rounds to finish second. Morgan matched Taylor's final-round 68 to tie for 10th place. The 279 score in the final round was LSU's best round of the season to that point. LSU's previous low round was a 281 shot in the first round at the Tennessee Tournament of Champions.

LSU carried the momentum from the Gary Koch into their next tournament, the eighth-annual Country Club of Louisiana Intercollegiate at the CCLA in Baton Rouge. LSU claimed its second title of the season by shooting a CCLA-record 8-under 856 to edge Tulsa by two strokes. The previous 54-hole record was an 862 shot by East Tennessee State in 1998. The Tigers rallied from a four-stroke deficit after one round to win the event for the first time since 1993. Morgan once again was a model of consistency, as he shot consecutive 67s in the first two rounds then fired an even-par 72 in the final round for a 10-under 206 total. It was Morgan's second victory of the season. He also set a 36-hole record, shooting 134. Nathan Goulding, a junior college transfer from Midland making his LSU debut, shot back-to-back 69s to tie for 10th. Humphries also shot consecutive 69s to finish fourth. Morgan's 206 was a 54-hole record.

LSU began the spring season at the 2001 Gator Invitational in Gainesville, Fla. The Gator proved to be one of the Tigers' toughest tournaments of the season as they finished eighth. The tournament host and eventual national champion Gators defended their home course by winning the 2001 event. Morgan shot a 4-under 66 in round one and finished tied for 12th. Humphries and Goulding tied for 21st at even-par.

The next week LSU visited the state of Florida again for the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship. LSU fired a 9-under par 855 to finish third. Goulding posted three sub-par rounds to finish sixth.



In March, LSU hosted its second tournament of the season. The inaugural LSU Spring Invitational at the University Club was LSU's first at its true home course. LSU survived a first-round 14-over 302 to win the tournament by five strokes. None of the 18 teams in the tournament finished under par. LSU finished 9-over par. Morgan tied for second, Humphries finished 11th and Goulding placed 14th. Morgan missed winning his third tournament of the season by just three strokes.

On March 24, LSU visited the state of Georgia for the first of two straight tournaments. At the Schenkel/E-Z-Go Invitational at Statesboro, Ga. LSU finished 13th. Goulding was the Tigers top finisher at 25th. Morgan placed 49th, the only time all he did not finish in the top 20 during the season. The Tigers had just three rounds of par or better in three rounds at the Schenkel.

The next weekend in Augusta, Ga., Morgan led LSU to a fourth place finish by shooting an 8-under 208 and finishing third individually. The Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate was LSU's final tournament of the regular season. LSU finished eighth, and host Auburn won its second straight Hitchcock title. Morgan tied for second place, at 3-under 213.

LSU traveled to Sea Island, Ga., for the 2001 SEC Championships. The Tigers struggled to put together any consistent rounds and finished eighth for the second tournament in a row. Taylor finished ninth and Morgan 24th.

LSU then was still in position for its first NCAA Regional appearance in three years. The Tigers were rewarded with a bid to the 2001 NCAA East Regional at Williamsburg, Va. LSU struggled in the first two rounds, shooting a first-round 16-over 304, and an 11-over 299 in the second round. LSU found its stroke in the final round shooting a 1-under 287, but it was not enough to make a difference. LSU finished in a 19th place tie with two other schools, missing the cut by 34 strokes. The top 10 teams from the regional advanced to the NCAA Championships at Durham, N.C.

The 2000-01 season was a success for the LSU team in many ways. The Tigers won three tournament titles, their highest total since winning four in the 1988-89 season. Additionally, LSU participated in postseason play for the fifth time in six seasons. Senior Alan Morgan played in all 13 of LSU's tournaments and of his 39 rounds, 26 were par or better. He had seven top-10 finishes along with two victories. He finished with a 71.5 stroke average, the second-best for a single season in LSU history, behind former Tiger and PGA Champion David Toms' 71.27. He was named to the All-SEC First Team, named Golfer of the Year on the 2001 LSWA All-Louisiana Golf Team, and an Honorable Mention All-American as well. Jones was rewarded for a superb season by being named Louisiana Coach of the Year on the All-Louisiana Team. Humphries was named to the All-SEC Second-Team and to the SEC Academic Honor Roll. Junior Chip Lee and Damon Julian were also on the 2001 SEC Academic Honor Roll.

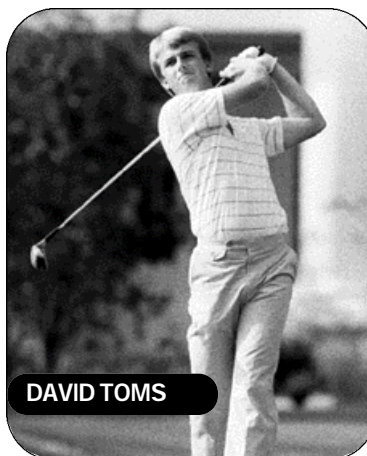

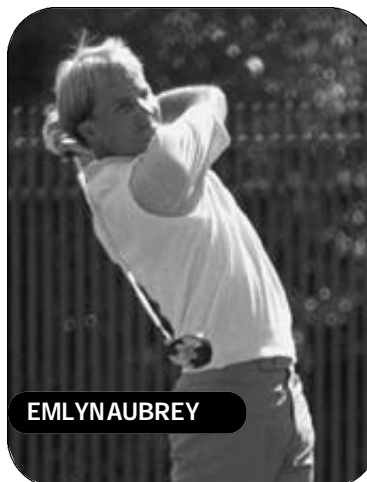

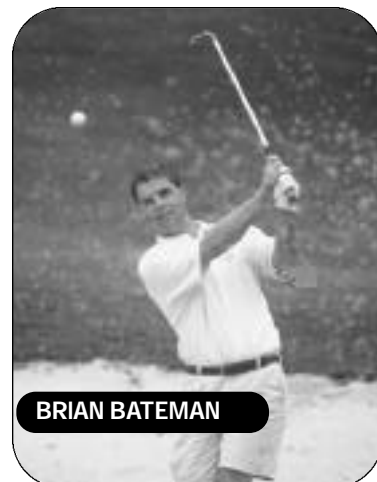

Former LSU All-American Toms has dream season on PGA tour

David Toms wondered if his chance to win a major championship would ever come. Toms, a former LSU All-American golfer finally accomplished what he had waited his entire career this past August.

On Sunday, Aug. 19, 2001, at the Atlanta Athletic Club in Duluth, Ga., Toms edged Phil Mickelson by one stroke to win the 83rd PGA Championship, his first career major championship at age 34. Toms shot a PGA scoring record 265. Toms highlighted his victory with a magnificent hole-in-one on the par-3 227-yard 15th hole in round three.

"The timing was perfect," Toms said. "It was on Saturday afternoon when thousands of people were around. It was a pretty timely shot."



Toms captured the country's attention with that shot and continued his mastery of the course on Sunday. With the world's top golfer, Tiger Woods out of contention for the championship, Toms was in position for the win, but had to fend off Phil Mickelson, who was also looking for his first major championship. Toms held a one-shot lead over Mickelson with four holes to play Sunday, but it came down to the final

hole, as most expected.

Toms made the biggest decision of his professional career on the 18th and final hole. The 490-yard par-4 18th included a forbidding lake that separated the main fairway from the green. Toms decided to play it safe and lay up as opposed to attempting to make it to the green on his second shot. His decision paid off, as he later sank a 12-foot putt to win the title by one stroke.

"Winning the PGA Championship was total satisfaction. It was a reward for all the years I put in, and all the practice," Toms said.

"I was a little shocked, but the whole weekend was just a dream come true."

Toms won the Compaq Classic in May at English Turn in New Orleans. In front of thousands of LSU fans dressed in purple and gold, Toms came back from a six-stroke deficit to beat, oddly enough, Mickelson. The PGA, though, was special, and was one of Toms' best chances to win one of golf's four major championships in his career.

"I never really had a chance to win one before, with Tiger Woods doing so well. I just tried to play this tournament like it was any other one."

"It is very hard to win a major or any tournament for that matter. There are so many variables to take into account, like the weather, tee time, or course conditions. You can't just show up and say 'I'm going to win this one.'"

Toms may now be a household name to many, but he has been a successful player long before he won the 2001 PGA Championship. Toms grew up in Denham Springs and lived there until the age of 12. He then moved to Bossier City where he attended Airline High School. Toms grew up an LSU fan and when it came time to choose a college he was very interested in coming to Baton Rouge.

"I could really go anywhere in the country I wanted to play, because I had won both the World Junior and the PGA National Junior in high school. I came and visited LSU and liked it right away. I felt like this was the place for me, I liked the coach, the players and the entire program."

Toms made one other visit to Texas and had a few others planned. Toms loved LSU so much that he canceled the remaining visits. The choice was clear to him where he would go. Toms said he liked then coach Buddy Alexander a lot, now the head coach at the University of Florida, and got along well with the players.

"I thought they had a good group of guys here. I really jelled with the guys, we made each other better. I felt like I could play right away, and after visiting LSU I chose to come here right then."

The decision worked out well for Toms and the LSU golf program as well. He indeed



played right away, and was named the Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year in 1986. In 1987 and 1988, Toms was named to the All-SEC First Team, and in 1988 he was named the SEC Player of the Year. In his senior season, 1989, Toms was once again named Player of the Year for the conference. It marked only the third time in SEC history that a golfer won consecutive Player of the Year awards.

In addition to being named to the All-Conference Team four years in a row, Toms was a four-time All-American. He was named an Honorable Mention member of the All-America team his freshman season, and a First-Team All-American in his final three seasons at LSU. Toms holds the school-record for career Top-10 finishes (29), career tournament victories (six), and has the lowest single-season stroke average (71.27) in 1989. Toms led LSU to back-to-back SEC Championships in 1986 and 1987 and won the individual SEC Championship in 1987.

His 65 at the SEC Championships at Knoxville, Tenn., in 1987 is tied for the third-lowest round in school history. At the 1987 Championships, Toms shot a 205 to lead the Tigers to the title. The win in 1987 was LSU's most recent SEC championship and



the last time the school has had an individual SEC champion.

Toms was at LSU at the same time current Tiger head coach Greg Jones was a player at South Alabama.

"I played in some of the same tournaments as Greg in college, Toms said. "He is doing a great job now at LSU."

Jones joined Toms as an All-American in 1986. Jones graduated in 1987 and proceeded to play five years professionally before taking over as head coach at his alma mater. Toms keeps a close eye on LSU, and his fans do the same with him.



"I find LSU fans wherever I go," Toms said. "My caddy spots them at every tournament I play in. He will say 'Hey look David, you have some more fans here.' It is nice to see the fans wearing purple and gold and chanting 'LSU, LSU' like they were at the Compaq Classic."

Toms career is seemingly only getting better. The PGA win earned him \$936,000 and a spot on the 2001 Ryder Cup Team. Due to the recent tragedy in America, the Ryder Cup has been postponed until August 2002. Toms will surely wait another year with patience; after all, he waited what seemed like an eternity for his first major.

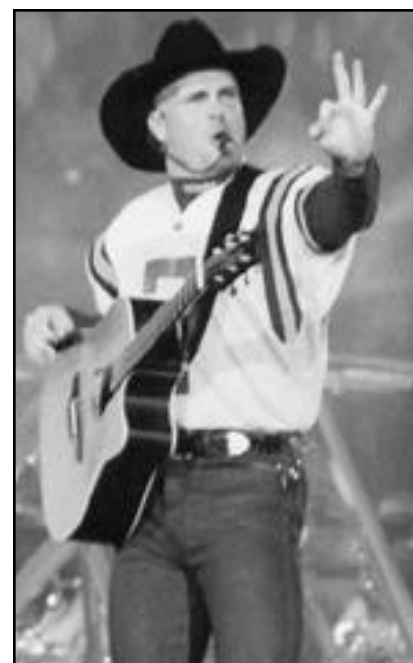

Campus Life

Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 141-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research, and public service. The University continuously develops programs of quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social, and cultural lives of citizens throughout the state - in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research University I - the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions - **LSU ranks in the top two percent of the nation's colleges and universities.** The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities in the country. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as



both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning

and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened Jan. 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869, and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction of the present campus began in 1922, and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body,

curricula, and services. During the 1960s, the University began to place increasing emphasis on research.

Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs, and Administrative Services.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. It provides a legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law and substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center is a member of the Association of American Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.



Weight/Training Room

LSU strength coach Tommy Moffitt was a perfect fit for the Tigers in his first season at LSU in 2000. He came to the Tigers from Miami where he was named the 1999 Collegiate Football Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society.

The LSU strength and conditioning facility, located in Tiger Stadium, was built in 1997 and features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment.

Measuring 10,000-square feet, LSU has one of the finest strength and conditioning facilities in the nation.

TRAINING ROOM

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the

23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.



Skip Bertman, Director of Athletics

J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001, succeeding Joe Dean, who finished his 14-year term as A.D. on Dec. 31, 2000. Bertman, who completed a brilliant 18-year career this June as LSU's head baseball coach, served both as athletics director and head coach during the 2001 baseball season before assuming the full-time role as A.D. in August.

With Bertman, LSU gains an athletics director who can provide the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$35 million athletic budget. He is one of the most respected people in the Baton Rouge community and throughout the state of Louisiana. His talent as a fund-raiser and businessman, as well as a public relations mastermind, developed the LSU baseball program into the best in the nation.

One only has to look at what Bertman has accomplished with the Tiger baseball program over the last 18 years to see he brings all the tools necessary to direct LSU's 20-sport athletic department.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA titles, including back-to-back championships in 1996 and 1997. His teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as LSU led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001). Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Those same characteristics will carry over to the athletics director's chair, where Bertman has inherited a program considered to be one of the best in the country.

Bertman, 63, guided the baseball Tigers to a 870-330-3 (.724) record in his 18-year tenure, including the 1991, 1993, 1996, 1997 and 2000 NCAA titles, 11 College World Series appearances and Southeastern Conference championships in 1986, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1996 and 1997. He was named National Coach of the Year on six occasions -- 2000, 1997, 1996, 1993, 1991 and 1986, and he served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

In a Baseball America poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. LSU was voted No. 3 in a poll of the greatest college baseball programs of the century.

LSU is one of only three schools to win five NCAA championships, and the Tigers are one of only 10 teams to have made 11 College World Series appearances. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles, and LSU (1990s) and Southern California (1970s) are the only schools to win four

championships in one decade.

Bertman mastered the art of winning big games throughout his career, guiding the Tigers to a 21-4 record in championship games in NCAA post-season play. That mark includes all NCAA Regional, NCAA Super Regional and College World Series championship contests. Bertman also directed LSU to the highest all-time NCAA Tournament winning percentage with a 89-29 (.754) record.

Bertman led LSU to its fifth national title in 2000, as the Tigers recorded a 52-17 mark, including a perfect 13-0 post-season record. LSU won the SEC Tournament with four straight wins, and the Tigers raced to a 9-0 mark in the NCAA Tournament. The Tigers captured the national title with a thrilling 6-5 win over Stanford in the CWS championship game, as LSU scored four runs in the last two innings to overcome a 5-2 deficit. Catcher Brad Cresse's RBI single in the bottom of the ninth inning drove home shortstop Ryan Theriot with the winning run. LSU became only the third school in NCAA baseball history to win five national championships, joining Southern California and Arizona State.

The Tigers took their first crucial step toward college baseball prominence in 1983 when Bertman was hired to pump new blood into the program. He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83).

Bertman was known as the "best assistant coach in college baseball" while a member of Ron Fraser's staff at Miami, and he brought to LSU the same brand of exciting, winning baseball he helped install at UM.

Even before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

Bertman left Miami Beach High School in 1974 to author the book, *Coaching Youth League Baseball*, funding the project out of his own resources. The book has become required reading for youth league coaches around the nation and in many foreign countries.

In 1975, Bertman went back to coaching at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.
